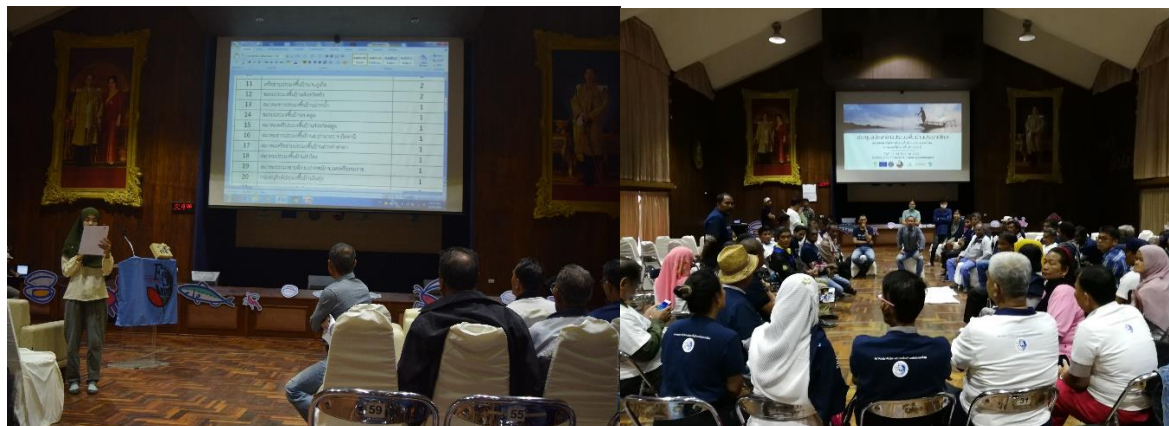
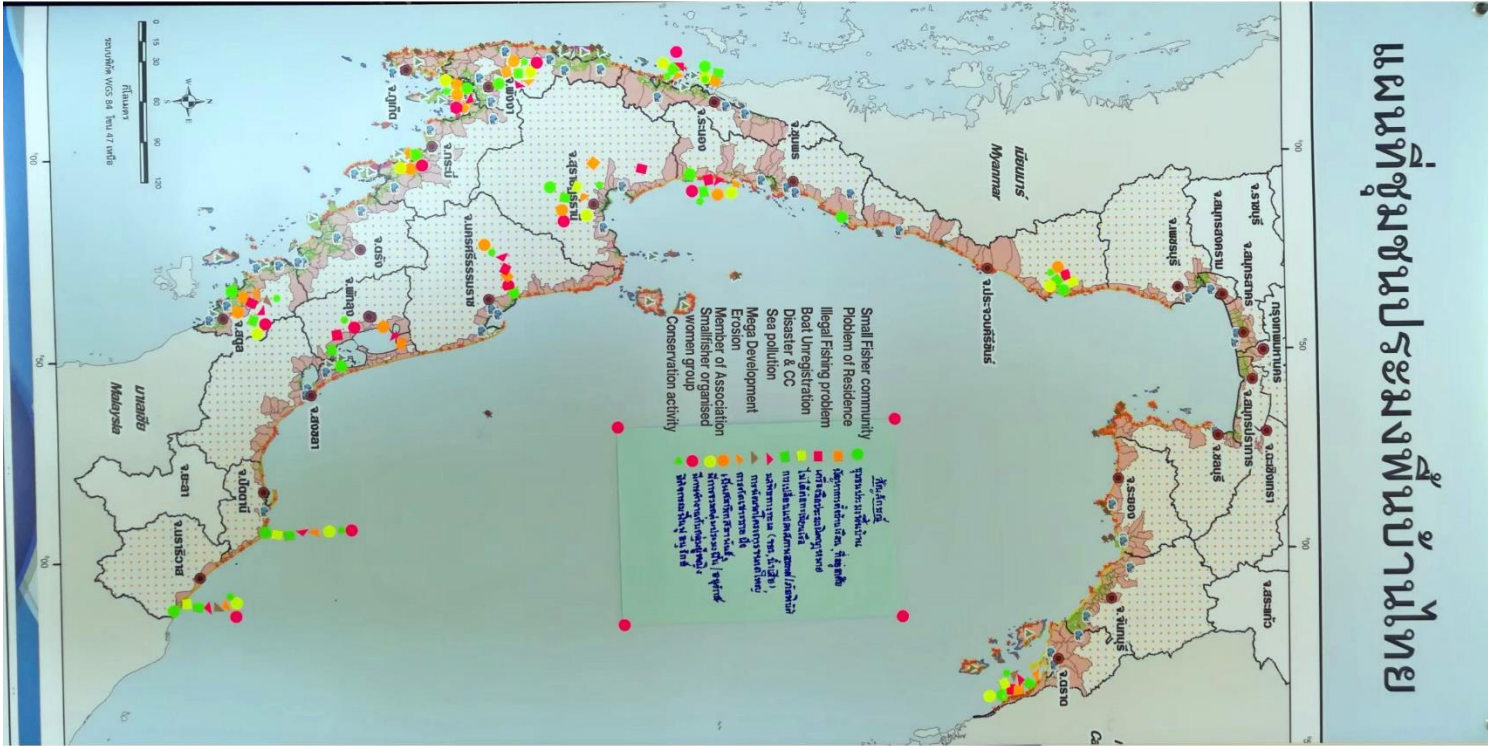


Photo 22 Thai Small fisherfolk association committee's election

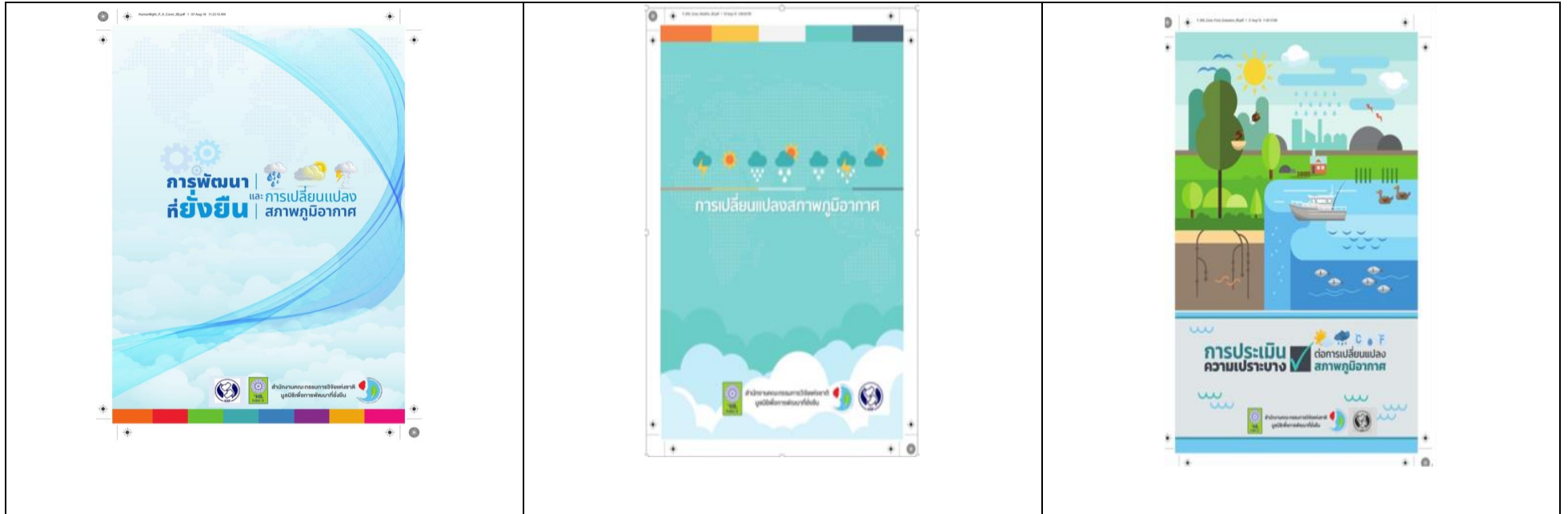

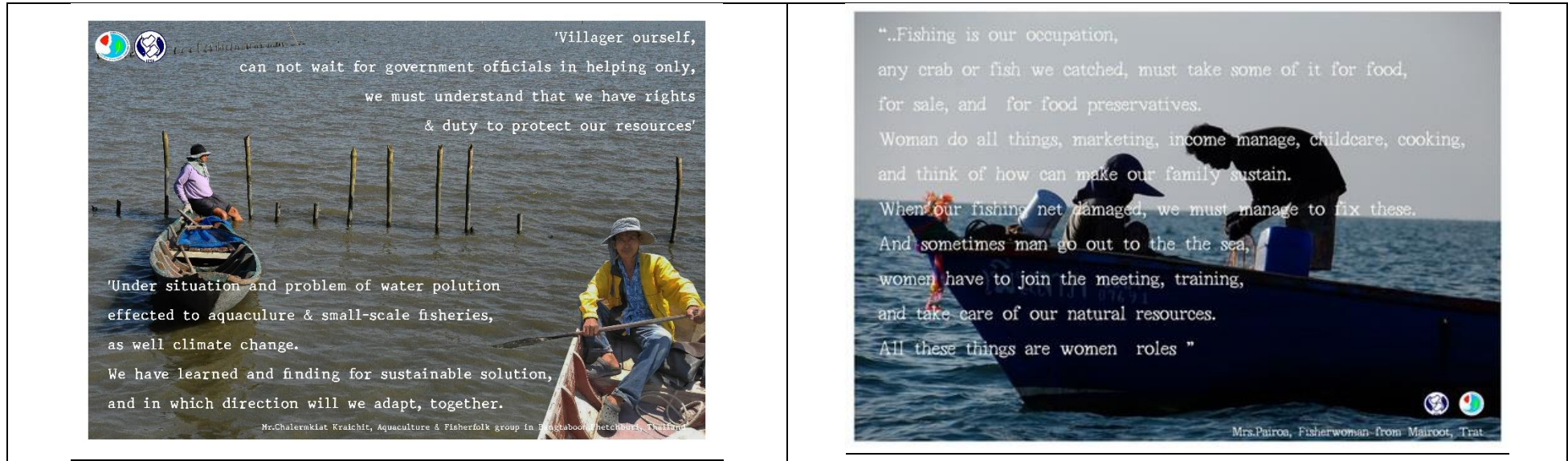


