Health Ecology Fairness Care

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They express the contribution that organic agriculture can make to the world, and a vision to improve all agriculture in a global context

They guide their development of positions, programs, and standards.

# The origins of the PGS



- Professionalization of the organic
  sector, increase of quality
  assurance- certification schemes to
  provide credible guarantee for
  consumers seeking organic produce
- Specially adapted for small holder farmers and direct markets, who have the most to benefit from organic, but faced barriers to entry third-party certification, including direct costs, paperwork, etc.
- Complementary, low cost, locallybased System

### What is a Participatory Guarantee System (PGS)?

"Participatory Guarantee Systems (PGS) are locally focused quality assurance systems. They certify producers based on active participation of stakeholders and are built on a foundation of trust, social networks and knowledge exchange"

(Term coined in 2004, IFOAM Official Definition, 2008)

GREATER EMPOWERMENT AND RESPONSIBILITY Examples: Ecovida (Brazil), OFNZ (New Zealand), CNG (USA), Nature et Progrès (France) CLEAR DOCUMENTED SYSTEM, STEPS ARE CONSISTENT CODIFIED AND CREDIBLE, BUT DFFER FROM 3<sup>RD</sup> PARTY CERTIFICATION ON THE APPROACH



## Some of the motivations for PGS



- Access to markets and secure better returns
- Promote **equity and fairness** throughout he production chain
- Promote consumer access to organic food and an alternative to large scale agriculture and factory farming
- Support **transformation of food systems** by building alternative food networks
- Enhancing ownership of production standards and certification
- **Continuous improvement** of practices enhanced by **knowledge exchange**
- Foster community values and support the potential for community development



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### Mechanisms to verify producer compliance

- **Description of the farm management plan** (declaration describing farming activities)
- **Peer reviews (farm inspections).** Knowledge exchange component
- **Knowledge building**: regular meetings and workshops to discuss technical issues, collective solutions

### **Structure and organization of PGS**

#### PEER REVIEW GROUP

Group of farmers and potentially other stakeholders Organize farm inspections and reports

#### **CERTIFICATION COMMITTEE**

Review peer review reports and validate decisions. Approve PGS members and enforce sanctions

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF**

Day-to-day management and paperwork. Facilitation

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




